#### International Convention 2023 - Boston

What a specular event !! 12,000 Lions from all corners of the globe attended this years Convention in Boston and to see so many take part in the Parade of Nations was a sight to behold.

A busy schedule of presentations, forums and speeches made for a very enlightening time. We even found time to fit in some sightseeing in this

beautiful city. The highlight of the last day was to witness the inauguration of our new International President, Patti Hill, who gave a superb speech on her thoughts and vision for the coming year. Her motto of 'Changing the World "was warmly welcomed by everyone. Mission 1.5 was officially launched. This mission is to increase our Global membership level to 1.5million members within the next three years (an increase of approx 150,000 from where we stand today). You will see from the photograph below, contributions to LCIF in the year hit a new high of \$67.9m. An unbelievable amount that has helped our organization to respond to so many disasters and needs throughout the world. And last, but not least, the swearing in of new District Governors - nearly 750 of them.

We will be discussing many things to try and make 2034/24 an even better year in our District. Objectives and goals for the year will be agreed and these will be communicated to all clubs via Zone Chairs.

### The Sanctuary Garden. "From little acorns mighty oaks do grow."

In 2022 Martin House Hospice embarked upon a project to raise £44,000 to create their new Sanctuary Garden. The Sanctuary Garden will be located outside of The Sanctuary (the Chapel) and will be a semi-private garden. Landscaped with a seating area and garden features it will provide an opportunity for the families to take some further time for reflection and remembrance. The design will evoke feelings of peace away from the practicality and associations inside the hospice.

What started out as a presentation in November 2022 to Ryedale Lions Club by Michelle Ford, Regional Fundraiser, North & East Yorkshire, Martin House Hospice, rapidly spread to become a cross Zones project involving 4 Zones and 21 Lions Clubs.

Within a short space of time the 21 Lions Clubs involved pledged £22,000 and the Matching Grant Application was approved by LCIF.

#### **Tickhill & District Lions Club**

Tickhill and District Lions have been delighted to support two Food Hubs in Harworth and Bircotes.

Food Hubs are a unique way of tackling food insecurity at a local level. These Hubs sell food at a heavily discounted rate. Unlike traditional Food Banks, any individual or family can access a Food Hub without a referral note, at any time. This helps people who are temporarily struggling, and removes some perceived stigma from the process.





We got involved with these fantastic Hubs, and this brilliant cause, to help those in need, but also to support the environment because the food would otherwise be destined for landfill.

With our financial support, the Food Hubs have been able to:

- Widen the variety of food available: often the Hubs are given carbohydrates and vegetables only. The Hubs have used our donations to purchase additional protein to allow people to access more nutritious meals.
- Improve the logistics of the Hubs: one needed a plug socket fitting, and another needed more shelving.

3. Subsidise the cost: some people were unable to afford the £3 donation, so we have given Hubs the ability to pay on their clients' be halves.

We are proud that our support has enabled around 60 people per week to access high-quality support via these Hubs, and that we are contributing towards the incredible community work that the volunteers at these Hubs undertake.

They need to raise £1 million every year. Tony was delighted to present a cheque for £4,000 to Amanda Tweedy, the Deputy Chief Executive when he visited the Charity at Pelton.

Amanda Tweedy, Deputy Chief Executive said:

"I really was overwhelmed when Tony presented me with a cheque for £4,000 from the Darlington Lions. It is a huge amount for us to receive and I know how hard the members work to continue fundraising throughout the year, so we are so very grateful to them all.

It was such a generous donation of £2000 and we are extremely grateful. NBB running costs are approximately £5.5K per month so this donation will be of considerable help to us in keeping our fleet on the road. Early in 2022 the Rothwell District Lions were contacted by The Leeds Hospitals Charity to ask if we could give a donation towards the building of a centre, to be based at Seacroft Hospital in Leeds, for the treatment of patients suffering from Motor Neurone disease (MND). The centre would treat patients with MND not just in Leeds but in the wider area.

The charity was seeking to raise in excess of £6m and we were told that any donation, however small would be gratefully received. It was to be built in honour of Rob Burrow who had played rugby league both for the Leeds Rhinos and for England. Rob had been a great favourite of both teams and news of his difficulties hit the rugby league community very hard. Sadly Rob had been struck down at a very early age with this terrible disease for which there is currently no known cure.

It was very quickly decided that rather than giving an immediate donation the club would over a period of a year designate a number of its fund raising efforts specifically towards giving a more substantial donation in the future. These events included an off road cycle ride, The Wild Boar Challenge, a fashion show, a joint event with our local Carnival Committee plus various raffles etc. In the event the club raised a total of £5000 which was duly presented to the hospital charity in June 2023.
