District Goals

As mentioned in the last newsletter, District Goals were discussed at our District Cabinet Meeting and the following goals were agreed to work to:

Membership : To grow membership by net 70 in the year through new member recruitment, improved retention and launch 5 branch plus. Target for each club to end the year by one additional member remains.

Leadership : 50% of ZC's and 50% of Club Officers to undergo officer training. Succession Planning : Develop rolling 5 year plan to avoid unfilled roles in the structure. Reporting : 75% of clubs to be reporting service in MyLCI by the end of the year.

We have got off to a good start to the year with 22 new members joining in the first two months. We extend a warm welcome to all and our thanks for choosing our great organization to give service. This means our net membership has grown by 14 since the start of the year.

Their Charity shop is a constant source of income to them, and clearly from the meeting a constant source of amusement as they discuss it's every day running by volunteers.

As well as the shop being open 6 days a week, they have many other events and services going on, including the loan of wheelchairs for those in need of one at short notice.

On 8 th August my visit to Boroughbridge also proved to be a very enjoyable meeting. From a club that was close to closure only a few years ago, the club now has 18 members and additional prospective members waiting. Vibrant and enthusiastic with excellent governance and a good rotation of officers. Very pleasing.

My visit to Pocklington District Lions Club on 21 st August was very enjoyable. They are a busy club with Disability scooters and Wheelchairs available for loan in large numbers, and the constant wear and tear on these will be a challenge. They had donated a Panthera bambino adjustable wheelchair last year, valued around £2300.00 new, roughly 7 years old and suitable for a child 4 - 12 years old. At the time they thought they had a suitable child to take it, but it didn't transpire. They are asking if any other clubs in the district could make good use of it. Contact direct to

Darlington Lions Club

Darlington Lions Charity Bookshop was first established over 40 years ago as a fundraising project using vacant commercial properties in the town centre to sell donated fiction and non-fiction books with over 6,000 books in stock. Every penny raised in the bookshop is spent to meet every day charitable needs, predominantly on a local basis, and manned by volunteers five days a week.

Over the years the nomadic life of the book shop has seen it operate from at least ten locations settling on its current home in Blackwell Gate Mews almost 30 years ago where it quickly grew from one to two shops.

To boost sales over ten years ago the previous £1 selling price was reduced to 50p where it has stayed ever since which may mean it is the longest sale ever to run in Darlington town centre. Although costs are carefully controlled and consist mainly of utilities and rent, they have significantly increased to the point where our Lions Group have had little choice but to bring the sale to an end restoring prices to £1 a book (3) for £2), with children's books remaining at 50p.

Joint chair of the bookshop committee Kevin Winkworth said "Over the course of the years we have become great friends with many of our customer's who regularly call in to view the ever changing stock and have a chat".



"Recently we have moved the main shop to a new position facing out onto Blackwell Gate, in Darlington where we can display our stock more clearly and give improved levels of customer service".

"One of our aims is helping children develop a love of reading and so during the summer holidays we will be giving a free children's book to any young families that come into the shop".

Fellow Joint Chair Lion Fred Thompson added "The new shop gives us the added opportunity to promote some of the other features of the charitable work of Lions Clubs including the collection and disposal of used spectacles to developing countries and the unique Lions Message in a Bottle service which warns medics of patient issues when they may be unable to do so themselves".

Caring For Others Starts With Caring For Ourselves

Let me start by introducing myself..... my name is Michelle Nicholson and I have recently been appointed as the Members Wellbeing officer for our district.

What is a Members Wellbeing officer?

My role is to provide information and resources to support the wellbeing of our members within the district. I am not providing counselling services or medical advice, the role of a wellbeing officer is to provide information and resources to members about ways in which they can lead healthy and fulfilling lives for longer. Many more of us are now living longer but sadly for many the last ten plus years of our lives, we are not in the best of health, emotionally and/or physically. Life has taken its toll on us and just when we have more time, we are not necessarily able to live it to the fullest extent.

My role as wellbeing officer is to collate resources and information that members can easily access to help them look after their own wellbeing and be there to support their fellow lions when life throws a curve ball.

The second part of my role is to be able to signpost members who may be struggling towards organizations and individuals who provide professional help and support for people, whether the need is for a member who is struggling with anxiety and depression, financial worries, grief, or whatever the need may be.

Why wellbeing, why now?

World events over the last few years have changed the way we live our lives for good. People have lost contact and become more isolated within their communities, the cost of living crisis is not only creating increased poverty and hardship for many more people, but it is also having a detrimental effect upon their health and wellbeing, add into the mix the devastation being caused through the effects global warming and the ongoing world conflicts and it is perfectly understandable why so many people are finding life tough going and reaching out to Lions for our help and support just to help them get through their day to day. The demands on us as Lions is increasing, our communities both locally and globally need us more now than ever before.

One of the many things that we all as Lions have in common is our compassion for others and being there for people who need a helping hand and a friendly face to turn to. The stark truth is that although we are Lions, we are still only human, and life takes its toll on us, we all experience the emotional rollercoaster of life and sadly none of us are getting any younger, so if we..... YOU want to continue to be there for your community, to continue with the vital work you and your fellow lions do, we all have to start taking some time for our own self-care. Investing some time in your own wellbeing is NOT selfish, we cannot be at our best to care and help our communities if we don't look after ourselves.

Caring for your community begins by caring for yourself and your fellow lions.

My Credentials

You may well be asking who is Michelle Nicholson and how credible is the information she will provide.

To put your mind at rest, I am a member of the Castleford & Pontefract District Lions Club and have been involved with lions most of my life, as a Leo, a Lioness and for many years now as a Lion.

In my professional life, I am a qualified mental health first aider, I have studied brain science for the last 13 years and I am currently working towards an Occupational Doctorate in Neuroscience. I have designed and developed wellbeing and mental health awareness programs for a number of organizations including Kia Motors UK, Sense, and Hertfordshire County Council

But I am not just an academic, I have struggled with my own emotional wellbeing and had my own curve balls that I have had to overcome. Fortunately for me, I have had the love and support of my family, but I am one of the fortunate ones, not everyone can rely upon blood relatives and that is why my role as members wellbeing officer for our 105N family of lions is so important to me.

Lions are a family, we not only need to focus on being there for our communities, we need to make the time to be there for ourselves and our fellow lions.

What can you expect?

My goal is to reach a point where any member within our district who is struggling in some way, it could be they have recently been bereaved, have had an accident or illness resulting in them feeling low or isolated, or life might just feel overwhelming, or they may be feeling tired, fatigued and lost their mojo...... know that they are not alone and they do not need to cope on their own, they have the support of their fellow lions

To make this the reality across the whole of our district will take time, I know that in some clubs members wellbeing is already on the radar but sadly not in all clubs and we can always do more.

What we as lions of 105N need to do is to:

- 1. Make sure members wellbeing, including our own wellbeing is on our radars
- 2. Start talking about our wellbeing as part of our everyday conversation, as they say on TV, "It's good to talk"
- 3. Be aware of the signs to look for when a person may be starting to struggle and feel comfortable and confident to reach out to them
- 4. Be aware of the information and resources you can signpost fellow lions to if they are struggling

Over the forthcoming months, I will be working on developing a number of resources, including information and tips leaflets, webinars, and seminars. I am hoping to set up a resource centre where any Lion can access the materials and information as and when required.

Some of the subject areas, I am working on as a starting point are: mental health awareness, managing stress, sleep well, winter wellbeing, starting a conversation about wellbeing.

I would love to hear from you with ideas about wellbeing resources and subjects that you would find useful.

DISTRICT 105N CONVENTION - 2ND-4TH FEBRUARY 2024



THE HOLIDAY INN, SCOTCH CORNER

Convention is being hosted by Teesdale District and Darlington Lions Clubs
